I. COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is an in-depth study of revival movements and spiritual renewal from the Day of Pentecost, through the Charismatic Renewal of the 1960's and 70's. It will also review recent trends in Charismatic Christianity. Principals and patterns are observed, weaknesses and errors are identified, and lessons are drawn for application today. The student will come away from this course with a greater appreciation for the work of the Holy Spirit in history and a sharpened sense to discern what God is doing in the Church today.

II. COURSE GOALS & OUTCOMES

- 1. To give the student an overview of church history from a Pentecostal/Charismatic perspective.
- 2. To acquaint the student with people and movements that have shaped the course of Christian and world history.
- 3. To sharpen the student's sense of discernment by examining both the strengths and weaknesses of past revival movements.
- 4. To strengthen the faith of the Pentecostal/Charismatic student by discovering his /her roots in Christian history.

IV. ASSIGNMENT & DUE DATES

A. Online Discussion (20%), Wednesday bi-weekly (Weeks 1, 3, 5, 7, and 9)

On Monday bi-weekly, a class discussion question will be posted after class by the professor under the "Discussions" portion of the online class portal. Provide no more than a paragraph (8 to 10 sentence) response to that question by midnight Wednesday of the same week. Additionally, read and review the comments of your classmates. This bi-weekly assignment is designed to facilitate an online dialogue that enables student to glean from one another.

B. Spiritual Gifts Assessment (10%)

C. Questionnaire (10%)

Answer the following questions with a minimum of a 4-6 sentence paragraph for each question. Submit your answers online as a Word or PDF document under the "Assessment" portion of the online class portal.

- 1. What is your current understanding of the Holy Spirit?
- 2. How would you describe the Holy Spirit to someone who has recently accepted Christ?
- 3. What role does the Holy Spirit play in your daily life at this time?
- 4. Review the results of your Spiritual Gifts Assessment that you completed online and turned in by September 14th. List your two strongest gifts. Do you see those gifts working in your life now, and how might you develop those gifts to be utilized more effectively in the future.?

5. How would you expect this class to help you achieve a higher level of Holy Spirit activity?

D. Book Response (20%)

Write a 750-word book response on the Hyatt textbook, 2000 Years of Charismatic Christianity. Utilize MLA formatting when writing your essay. The response should be comprised of a 250-word summary of the text and 500-word response. When writing the response, the following questions may help you formulate your ideas.

- How do you agree or disagree with the author? Why?
- What insights were most helpful to you? How will you apply those insights to your life and ministry?
- What do you believe to be the author's purpose for writing this book? Did they achieve that purpose?
- To whom would you recommend the book and why?

Note: Please do not list these questions in your Book Response. These questions are meant to help create meaningful content for the response portion of this assignment.

Submit your essay in a Word or PDF document under the "Assessment" portion of the online class portal.

E. Historical Reflection Essay (20%)

Write a 750-word Historical Reflection explaining the role of the three church fathers who have profoundly impacted the preservation of charismata. Provide both historical and scriptural references from at least three additional academic sources (book, commentary, scholarly article, etc.). Upload your essay as Word or PDF document under the "Assessment" portion of the online class portal.

F. Exam (20%)

The exam will be available online for a number of days. You may complete the exam at your convenience during that time period. The exam is found under the "Quiz" section of the online portal.

While taking the exam, you <u>may not</u> refer to any notes or study guides.

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C. Academic Honesty

1. Plagiarism is copying someone else's ideas, words, or sentence structures and submitting them as one's own. which is claiming the work of others as your own without specific acknowledgment. It is always required that a student site resources used in any paper that is written. Both students and faculty at River City School of Leadership are expected to deal ethically with other's materials, whether it is in the form of print, electronic, video, multimedia, or computer software.

2. Collaboration (e.g. writing a paper with someone else so that the resulting paper is not the product of the person turning it in) is not permitted unless specifically allowed by the instructor. Unless noted on the course syllabus a student should assume that the required work is meant to represent their own efforts. It is permissible to have a proofreader review one's paper and comment on the grammar and general paper structure; however, the thought and content of the paper must be the student's.

D. Late Assignment Policy

For each week that an assignment is late, it will receive a 10% grade deduction. An assignment will be considered late unless the student has prior permission from the instructor for a later due date. No homework will be accepted after the end of the term. Additional points can be docked by the teacher for not meeting assignment requirements or standards.

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E. Absenteeism

An absentee is defined as not being present in-person or online when a class is being taught. Students are allowed two absences in each semester. If a student is absent more than twice, they will be given an I (Incomplete) for the semester. An **absentee can be erased if a student watches/listens the full video/audio content** of a class that they missed, writes a 250-word response to the class video that was watched/listened to, and **send the notification and the response to River City by email** (info@rivercityschool.com) that they have made up the absence, noting the date of the absence. The latest a student can submit an email to this effect is the day following the last class of that semester.

F. Tardiness
